- The morning session on cold weather training will be short. (10 - 15 minutes) Most of the morning will be devoted to setting up camp and preparing the noon meal.
- Water will be available. Troops should bring water jugs to transport water and are encouraged to bring them full of water to the event.
- Mr. Butterfield will be supplying firewood.
- Lunch will be a chili cook-off. (To maximize what's available for the boys to eat). Please bring what's necessary for your unit to prepare chili.
  - The simplest method to make chili is to prepare it ahead of time so it only needs to be heated at the event.
- Dinner (stew) will be provided by the district.
- Units are encouraged to bring sleds to haul gear to the campsite. Cars can only get to within 200 yards of the campsite.
- Sledding hills are available. Please note, the guide to safe scouting was amending in August 2009 and now says "the use of helmets is recommended for sledding and sliding...". A copy of that page is attached as is a hyperlink to the document itself.

- Latrines will be primitive and leave no trace. Individuals are required to use a plastic bag to capture their solid waste and take it with them after each use. Kitchen garbage bags work well for this purpose. Please bring plastic bags and toilet paper with you.
